The DC Office of Planning (OP) plans for our residents through the lens of our **neighborhoods** and ensures the long-term growth of the District of Columbia advances our values of an inclusive and vibrant city. We plan for a positive future in which all District residents can thrive, regardless of income, race, age, or background.

OP guides development in DC's distinctive neighborhoods by engaging stakeholders and residents, performing research and analysis, and publishing planning documents, including the Comprehensive Plan.

Leads cross system research, data, and spatial analysis to develop policies and plans that support the Comp Plan.

## The Comprehensive (Comp) Plan

- 20-year vision for the District's future planning & development
- The Comp Plan is a high-level guiding document that sets a positive, long-term vision for the District, through the lens of its physical growth and change
  - Adopted as legislation in 2006
  - First amended in 2011 for technical corrections
  - 2<sup>nd</sup> amendment cycle launched in 2016

### About Neighborhood Planning

#### **Core Functions:**

- Prepare small area plans and corridor studies to guide growth and development at the neighborhood scale
- Coordinate and monitor small area plan implementation
- Participate in city-wide initiatives that have a neighborhood impact:
   Comp Plan, Mayor's Housing Goals, Ward development activity and
   participate in key discussions with property owners, community
   stakeholders and other OP divisions
- Serve as a liaison to elected officials and community stakeholders on land use, development, and planning issues

### What Are Small Area Plans?

- Supplement the Comp Plan with neighborhood specific recommendations
- Allow residents to develop a vision for the corridor that can identify strategic priorities and shape future development
- Identify gaps and opportunities
- Guide budget decisions and agency investment
- Are approved by Council as legislation

#### About the Plan

With community support and involvement, OP will develop an updated vision and implementation plan for Pennsylvania Avenue SE, east of the Anacostia River. We

are planning again in order to:

 Build on the lessons learned from the <u>2008 Pennsylvania Avenue SE</u> <u>Corridor Land Development Plan</u>;

- Revisit existing recommendations and implementation challenges; and
- Uplift new community needs and desires.



### Plan Goals


The SAP will establish a framework that will guide development and reinvestment in the neighborhood to meet the following goals:

- Encourage economic development and retail opportunities;
- Improve transportation access and connectivity;
- Enhance a safe, accessible, and vibrant public realm; and
- Explore housing opportunities and social and economic resiliency strategies to improve access for upward mobility.

- Provide technical expertise, data collection, and analysis for the study area

- Collaborate with community stakeholders
- Coordinate with ongoing initiatives
- Host community conversations and town halls
- Co-develop recommendations
- Write and produce the plan
- Work with DC Council

### Role of the IAWG

- Information sharing
- Fill data gaps
- Community engagement support
- Co-development and vetting of recommendations
- Representation during legislative process as needed
- Input into the implementation strategy and stewardship over agency recommendations

### Role of the CAC

- Provide knowledge about issues, needs, and desires
- Disseminate information
- Learn about the planning process and have direct access to interagency partners
- Work with District government to brainstorm and codevelop recommendations for the plan
- Participate in and help steward recommendation implementation
